What is Family Promise of Atlantic County?

Family Promise of Atlantic County is a nonprofit organization that is committed to helping low-income families achieve lasting independence. Approximately one dozen congregations in Atlantic County and other volunteers meet homeless families' immediate needs for shelter, meals and support.

UUCSJS is one of the host congregations of Family Promise of Atlantic County. We are working both internally and at the county level to get the program underway. When fully operational, Family Promise of Atlantic County will provide temporary housing, food, and services to homeless families.

How does it work? Each host congregation will house one or more homeless families, up to 14 people, for one week, four times a year. When we are hosting, we will provide breakfast and dinner each day that week. UUCSJS volunteers have agreed to prepare and serve meals, with two members spending the night at the UU Center during the hosting weeks. Family Promise of Atlantic County supplies the cots for sleeping.

During the daytime, the families go off to a Family Promise Day Center. Children will go to their respective schools, and parents will utilize the Family Promise Day Center to search for jobs and receive occupational counseling. In the evening, they return to the congregation that is hosting them that week.

Family Promise of Atlantic County still needs two more congregations to serve as host congregations before we can begin. We also need a van, a Day Center, and more funds.

That is why it's so important that the Family Promise of Atlantic County Art Auction is successful!

So please buy a ticket **and attend!** Tickets are now on sale after services: see either Prim Reeves or Janet Longo. For \$10, you get entry to the auction, door prizes, a chance auction, wine and cheese, hors d'oeuvres, and desserts. **We have the potential to make thousands of dollars, depending on how many people are present at the auction an hour into it. “A white police officer tells Raziq to get up and leave the building. Standing and wiping his face, Raziq tells him that he works at the school. He attempts to show his school ID and key to the building. The officer ignores both -- Raziq's biggest indication that the stakes of his every movement are dangerously high...

It took Raziq a few days to realize just how shaken and upset he was, and it didn't immediately register with me that I ought to go and visit him. Aloud and internally he searched for alternative explanations for what happened to him, something other than racial profiling. For some black folks, especially well-off millennials, the internal dance of navigating race brings exhaustion because so many of us were convinced by white friends growing up that racism no longer mattered, if it even existed. *Maybe that had nothing to do with race. Maybe that cop is rude to everyone. Maybe I'm just reading too much into it. Maybe I shouldn't complain.* We can talk ourselves into circles of anxiety and confusion.”

Native Plant Sale a Huge Success!

Thanks so much to each of you for helping to make our 7th annual Plant Sale & Swap a huge success!

Our sale and swap take a lot of work to pull off from so many people: help with planning, generating publicity, designing and printing order forms (thanks, Judy, for your talents and time on that huge job!), tabulating and double-checking orders, collecting boxes, organizing & labeling boxes, off-loading plants, checking plant numbers, filling orders, double-checking orders, guarding the plants overnight, assisting customers with orders, setting up and taking down the tables, supplying food to the volunteers, ID'ing plants, answering plant questions, promoting natives, and assisting with Sunday's post-sale... I am leaving out some of the tasks, but you can see why *all* of you who helped were needed to pull off this annual sustainable-landscaping fund-raiser.

Extra thanks to some special friends for their expertise: Master Gardeners Patti Cassidy and Steve Whitford, and South Jersey's premier native plant educator, naturalist and author, Pat Sutton.

Here's a run-down of the numbers for this year's sale:

- 76 advance orders (even more than last year's previous high total of 54)
- Advance order perennials and grasses: 884
- Advance order shrubs and trees: 256
- Swap and other plants purchased: 180
- Estimate of plants swapped and donated: 350+

We should all take pride in the number of native plants we distributed to homes in southern NJ as well as to a school, a community college native pollinator garden, and two Galloway Township native plant gardens!

Board of Trustees
HIGHLIGHTS
May 2015

The **regular monthly meeting** of the **UUCSJS Board of Trustees** was held on Wednesday, May 20, 2015 at 6:30 pm in the Lounge at the UU Center, President Art Wexler presiding. Chalice lighting words were chosen by Karen York, and joys and concerns were shared.

• **Discussion/Action Items**

—**New model for Social Justice.** The Board welcomed former president Jim Gentile, who along with Ron Hutchison has agreed to co-chair a new Social Justice (SJ) advisory panel. The new model is being implemented to restructure *how* (and *how many*) social justice actions are initiated, supported, and carried out within our congregation. [The Board voted to approve the new Social Justice model, derived from UUA resources, at a special meeting held on Wednesday, February 4, 2015.] Gentile had questions for the Board about how the new model was intended to function, and in the discussion that followed it became clear that more information needs to be communicated to the congregation about this new way of “doing Social Justice.” Words about the new model have been put forward in the past few months, but more is needed.

—**Request from Anti-Racism Task Force.** The first “action group” likely to be sanctioned under the new SJ model is the newly formed Anti-Racism Task Force, which as its first act has requested Board approval to display the banner, “Black Lives Matter” at the UU Center.

—*A motion to approve the Anti-Racism Task Force’s request to display a “Black Lives Matter” banner was passed by the Board unanimously, with the expectation that this will be accompanied by an educational process, and with an inquiry as to cost of acquiring the banner.*

• **Announcements**

—The next **Board Talk Back** will be held on Sunday, June 14 at 11:15 am in a downstairs classroom.

—The **UUCSJS Family Promise Team** urges support for Family Promise of Atlantic County’s **Art Auction fundraiser**, to be held Saturday, June 6 at 7 pm at the Church of St. Mark and All Saints, 429 Pitney Rd., Galloway. Tickets are \$10 each and may be purchased from congregant Janet Longo. To earn the most reward, attendees must stay at least one hour into the auction.

• **Reports**

1) Treasurer’s Report. Treasurer Karen York distributed her written report for May 2015, showing account balances (as of 04/29/15) as follows: TD Bank Checking/Operating: \$19,209.91; TD Bank Designated: \$458.41 (of that, \$208.41, Margaret’s Circle); TD Bank Reserve (Capital): \$3,101.05 (of that, CC3 funds, \$101.05); and Fidelity Investments Reserve (Capital): \$1,793.34. [Total Reserve: \$4,894.39 (CC3 funds, \$101.05)]

—**Capital Campaign 3.** As previously reported, the general canvass phase of CC3 has been completed, with 53 pledges totaling \$130,513 in contributions. Special payments to mortgage principal (*representing paid pledges to date*): \$96,185.50; pending payments to mortgage principal: \$5,045; remaining mortgage principal (*after regular May installment plus the pending payments*): \$276,583; outstanding pledges toward mortgage principal due by December 2016: \$29,282.50.

—**Mortgage Refinancing.** The treasurer reported as follows: “We have a commitment letter from TD Bank for a mortgage of \$290,000, amortization period of 20 years, with an interest rate of 3.99%, to be reset in 5 years.” She stated that we now expect the refinance amount to be \$270,000 or lower. We anticipate that the closing will occur on or before June 10, she said; the final amount of refinance will affect our monthly

payments for the next five years. The title search and financial review have been completed, she added.

—**Building Use Request.** The treasurer told the Board that the Coalition for Peace and Justice has requested use of the sanctuary on Friday, August 7 from 6-9 pm for a remembrance of the 70th anniversary of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki (August 6 and 9, 1945), “to remind people of the unrealized promise to abolish nuclear weapons worldwide.” The event will include speakers and possibly, a film; light snacks will be served. The Coalition has requested waiver of the building use fee, requiring Board approval.

—*A motion to approve waiver of the building use fee for the Coalition for Peace and Justice commemorative event on Friday, August 7, was passed by the Board unanimously.*

—**Utility Pole Incident.** The treasurer was happy to report that our insurance company, Church Mutual, has been successful in its subrogation effort following the two-car accident on Pomona Road in February that smashed our electric conduits housed in a utility pole. We have been informed that a check for \$1,000 to reimburse our deductible is “in the mail.”

2) Minister’s Report. Rev. Cynthia Cain has taken the first of two months’ vacation (May 15 to June 15). Her annual report has been received and will appear in the reports compendium to be sent out before the Annual Meeting on Sunday, June 7. Rev. Cynthia, who is an *ex officio* member of the Board, could not be present at the May meeting.

3) Staff & Committee Reports. The usual call for Board reports was waived in May due to the request for annual reports; the deadline was extended to Friday, May 22. Response has been good and annual reports to the congregation are expected to be circulated on or before Sunday, May 31, one week ahead of the Annual Meeting.

• **Updates/Follow-Up**

—**Ministerial Search Committee** (MSC). Board member Melissa Hutchison reported that she has re-confirmed their willingness to serve with each of the seven (7) UUCSJS members who were nominated most often by fellow members and who agreed to accept this assignment. These seven nominees will be introduced to the congregation on Sunday, May 24 with an insert in the Order of Service, and by other means such as the MWA. The Search committee will be placed before the congregation for approval at the Annual Meeting on Sunday, June 7.

—**Bylaws Changes.** Secretary Judy Pereira told the Board that one additional needed change has been found that will need approval at the Annual Meeting on Sunday, June 7, for a total of five (5) proposed amendments, two of which pertain to the Ministerial Search Committee. A revised set of proposed Bylaws changes will be sent to congregation members as soon as possible, on or before Sunday, May 24, with the additional change clearly marked on page 7 of the Bylaws.

—**Website.** On behalf of the still-informal Communications team, Vice President Jon Luoma reported that progress has slowed a bit of late; “we’re kind of stuck,” he said. However, the group continues to embrace the importance of improving our UUCSJS presence across multiple social media platforms, developing a new logo, and much more. *Stay tuned.*

• **Adjournment** – The meeting was adjourned at 8:42 pm.
